MTI BAIS MEDRASH: A HUB OF TORAH

"Walk into our bais medrash and you'll see the enthusiasm and passion for learning," says Rabbi Dovid Fromowitz, rosh yeshiva. Baruch Hashem, the bais medrash enrollment doubled in size this year, and the bochurim are learning with hasmada and blossoming into true bnei Torah.

"The Gemara says 'יגעתי ומצאתי תאמין' –



when a person works, it is impossible for him not to grow in Torah. That is what we see happening in our bais medrash," says Rabbi Avrohom Goldman, rosh yeshiva and magid shiur in the bais medrash. "The chevra is working very hard and growing unbelievably. The Steipler Gaon says that the main pleasantness of learning Torah comes from understanding it deeply; the bais medrash bochurim regularly taste this sweetness, which comes only after grappling with a sugya until they gain clarity."

Learning Torah develops the boys outside the bais medrash as well. When the talmidim dedicate "their themselves to learning, commitment to Yiddishkeit takes off, their davening takes off, and their middos take off," says Rabbi Goldman. Their growth brings them tremendous joy and satisfaction. "A bochur's joy plays a critical role in his growth: the אגלי טל calls the simcha of learning the syringe that injects Torah into the bloodstream."



This year, the yeshiva has added a new program for the bais medrash bochurim: second- and third-year bochurim make strides in their learning through preparing and presenting Gemara and mussar chaburos to their peers. In Gemara, they present a sugya from one of the classic roshei yeshiva of the last century that they

The bochurim learn for close to two


hours every after dav Mincha, twice as long as a regular bekius seder. At the start of each Rabbi seder, Moshe Chaim

spent time working on. In mussar, they expound upon a maamar chazal with its intricacies, and explain and defend their understanding of what lessons chazal are teaching us. This process teaches them how to develop and deliver an idea. "It's like teaching someone how to make a cholent," says Rabbi Goldman. "You explain it to them, and they understand, but then when they make it themselves, they get a different type of understanding."

The bais medrash talmidim create a positive peer group that uplifts everyone they come in contact with. "There's a tremendous chevrashaft," says Rabbi Goldman. "The bochurim are really connecting and bonding, both inside and outside the bais medrash." This atmosphere envelops the underclassmen as well, when bais medrash bochurim contribute their hasmada during high school hachana,

chazara, chavrusa learning, or an optional bekius program (see below). The yeshiva cultivates a relationship between the high school boys and the bais medrash bochurim through a unified night seder, during which bais medrash bochurim learn with high school talmidim. Both parties gain from this relationship. High school students observe relatable role models who were in their places a few years before. When they see how happy the bais medrash bochurim are, they

desire that same satisfaction. Simultaneously, the bais medrash bochurim learn how to give to others, which is a critical attribute of a ben Torah.

We are so grateful to Hakadosh Baruch Hu that we have been able to stay open for in-person learning this year and that the bais medrash can continue to reverberate with the sweet sounds of Torah learning. We wish the bochurim success in their continued growth as bnei Torah.
